QCS Review Best Buy

Mike and Charles brought along a package of technological eye candy for the clubs to oogle. They opened up the presentation by sharing video previews of VISTA, the new Microsoft operating system. Essentially VISTA will be incorporating a 3-D visual desktop along with improved built in security through Windows defender. The new parental controls were impressive. The interface allows the parent to monitor their child's use of the computer and the internet with a computer activity report. With VISTA you have the ability to scale up thumbnail images with the mouse.

They detailed the basic computer requirements, but realistically stated that to enjoy the full benefits of Vista's new approach you need a 64 bit processor, 2 GB of ram, a powerful video card, and a 350 watt power supply to support the increase in computing and visual power. Mike concluded that the probable VISTA release will occur in February as the upgrade coupons issued with currently purchased systems expire on March 11th.

IPODS and MP3 players are the rage for playing music. Charles noted that consumers need to decide which direction to go because the Apple IPOD and the MP3 Technology are incompatible. You should not purchase these devices

with the expectation of sharing music liberally with your friends and relatives because IPODS check for copyright permissions. He also noted that MP3 players' solid stage circuitry lend themselves use while jogging, they have no moving parts.

On of the noteworthy gadgets on the stage was the Sling Box. With this multimedia gadget you can view your local TV programming via a personal internet web page anywhere in the world. You need a high speed internet connection however. Your cable and computer ethernet cable function through the Sling Box to achieve this effect.

Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) is the latest rage in phone communications. They described the VONAGE service that connects your phone to the high speed internet for unlimited calling in the U. S. and Canada for \$26.95 a month. MediaCom also has VOIP service. Best Buy sells the phone accessories for this version of internet telephony.

With all of the new computing power and multimedia wizardry, Mike highlighted that external USB hard drives are a useful medium to storage data, photos and music. They brought along a Western Digital MyBOOK 250 GB drive as an example.

Best Buy merchandising has been most successful in their sale of Plasma, and LCD screens. The prices have become affordable. Mike related that he purchased a Plasma TV on an employee discount for \$5,000 several years ago. Now a similar setup runs around \$999.

He also mentioned that plasma and LCD's are best applied in specific settings. For example a plasma screen will not work in a room with side windows and lighting due to glare. An LCD screen would be a better solution.

To say the least everyone was a bit bedazzled by all of these holiday gadgets. Mike and Charles gave us a good overview of what's available. One lucky member won the

E-Mail: Be Less Annoying

Everyone — including Bill Gates — can use e-mail more efficiently. And learn how not to do really dumb things.

I've come to the conclusion that everyone needs to take a test before being able to use e-mail. No, I'm serious. You have to take an e-mail test. If you pass, you get an e-mail license. Proudly hang it on the wall. Screw up--send lots of messages with blank subject lines, say--and your license is pulled. You go on probation and attend mandatory remedial e-mail training.

Why am I being so hardnosed? I have a laundry list of ways people drive me wild with e-mail. I wrote about a few in "Get Relief From Annoying E-Mail," my July, 2006 "Hassle-Free PC" column:

But I ran out of room in the print column, so here are some more tips, including how to stop being obnoxious with your e-mail.

To Whom Am I Speaking?

Sometimes I have absolutely no idea who's sending me an e-mail, and this is a problem. I mean, I'll say something to another guy that I wouldn't dream of uttering to a lady my mother's age. [*Sorry, Mom.*]

* **Don't share.** If you and your live-in (spouse, significant other, whatever) use the same e-mail address, stop it. Extra e-mail addresses are free and consolidating e-mails into one mailbox is confusing the dickens out of me because I never know who I'm writing to.

* **Use a sig line.** Make life easier for me: Add a signature line with your name and e-mail address using the hot-linked mailto:steve_bass@pcworld.com format. It's easier to reply just to you if your e-mail was sent to many people; it's also great for when I

forward your e-mail--the new recipient doesn't have to cut and paste your address.

* **Use your real name.** Don't get me wrong, I love your beer-belly49832@yourisp.com. The problem is, I haven't a clue who you are. Be a champ and add your real name in the signature line. And a favor? Don't use initials.

Do I Need to Read This Right Now?

Look, I'm a very busy man (or so I tell my wife and editor), and I get tons of e-mail every day. I need to do e-mail triage--you know, scanning the inbox for the hottest messages and reading them first. But honestly, I can't do this with most e-mail I get. So here's what I recommend**The subject is...** Tell me, clearly and briefly, what your message is about in the subject line. I delete all messages with vague subjects--Hi, Hello, or worse, an empty subject line (oh, do I hate that!). And make sure you don't trigger my spam filter by using all capital letters, exclamation points, and words you typically see in junk e-mail, like "free," "spam," "mortgage," or "Viagra."

* **Exec summary.** Give me a one- or a two-sentence overview at the start of your e-mail. "I have a complicated issue," you might start out, "involving a Dell, memory cards, and SP2. If you have time to help, I've provided details below."

* **Save time.** Use [NM] or [EOM] (they stand for "no message" or "end of message") in the subject line as a shorthand way of responding with a simple "thank you" or an acknowledgement. This helps reduce the number of e-mails I need to open; many of the people at PC World use the trick and it's increased everyone's productivity.

And Your Point Is?

Once I actually open an e-mail, I need to get the point quickly so I can reply to the sender if necessary, then move on to the next one. But lots of the missives I get are, how to

say it?, a mess.

* **Use paragraphs.** Obvious, right? Nope. I get e-mails with one long paragraph the length of the Gettysburg Address. Break it up into three or four smaller ones. By the way, my limit is three or four paragraphs; after that I start dozing. [*Editor's note: I noticed.*] And send a test message to a buddy to make sure your e-mail program isn't removing paragraph returns.

* **By the numbers.** If you have more than one question or point, number them. It makes replying a whole lot easier if I can refer to the numbers.

* **Subject shorthand.** When you reply or forward an e-mail, it's helpful if you stick one or two descriptive words in front of the original subject so the recipient has an idea of what's in store. For instance, I use tags such as "Update," "Confirmation," or "Really Dumb."

Miscellaneous Gripes

Think I'm done kvetching? Nope, no such luck.

* **Attachment don'ts.** Don't attach anything executable--period. If on the off chance I've asked you to send a program, stick it into a zipped file.

* **Keep it private.** Don't reply to a mailing list with "great idea" or "I agree." Reply privately instead. Select a small part of the original message for context's sake.

* **Stay plain, Jane.** Avoid fancy formatting, gaudy colors, and flowery backgrounds. Two reasons: first, what's cool on your monitor looks like hell on mine; and second, that extra coding increases the download time for folks with slower connections.

* **Dear [InsertName]**. Private note to PR flacks: If you can't use mail merge properly, don't.

Tech News

SP3 for Win XP

Microsoft has confirmed that

there will be a 3rd service pack for Windows XP. They declined to release further details, but said that Windows XP SP 3 will be available after Windows Vista ships, scheduled for the end of 2006. Microsoft released the most recent Windows XP service pack, SP2, in August 2004. The service pack was one of the most significant updates to the Windows OS that Microsoft ever produced, and it included features to make Windows more secure.

Microsoft Employee warns against downloading from unofficial site

A Microsoft employee has warned against downloading an unauthorized version of Windows XP Service Pack 3 (SP3) that has surfaced on Hotfix.net, a popular Web site that provides software patches. The employee told users that downloading an unofficial version of Windows XP SP3 provided on The Hotfix.net would likely harm their computer and put them "out of support" from Microsoft because it is not an official Microsoft package. Each of these hotfixes can be obtained for free from Microsoft by calling their support lines, the employee said. SP3 will be released after Windows Vista ships next year.

Robotic Cars Make History

The Stanford Racing Team's robotic car, "Stanley," drove autonomously across 131.6 miles in the Mojave Desert in six hours and 53 minutes, finishing about 11 minutes faster than Carnegie Mellon's "Sandstorm." All of the teams made history during the weekend. They were the first autonomous vehicles to travel far within a specific time frame, as well as the first to finish the 2-year-old race (last year no one finished at all). A DARPA spokesman said this likely means the end of the Grand Challenge. DARPA is now hoping to see the technology take-off.

Real ID Act

The Real ID Act lays out minimum national standards for licenses, which will have to include a digital photo, anti-counterfeiting features and machine-readable technology. States will have to verify all documents presented to support license applications, such as birth certificates, Social Security cards and utility bills, with the issuing agency, and will be required to link their license databases so they can all be accessed as a single network. States will also be required to verify that a person applying for a license is in the country legally. Another Real ID Act requirement is that a person's license and Social Security card must bear the same name--not a nickname or shortened version.

HP Recalls Laptop Batteries

HP has recalled around 135,000 lithium ion rechargeable battery packs worldwide after several melted or charred the plastic cases of laptops. The battery is used with the HP Pavilion, Compaq Presario, HP Compaq and Compaq Evo laptops, company spokesperson, Mike Hockey, said. The company received 16 reports of batteries overheating, with four cases of damage to the laptops. No injuries have been reported. Consumers can verify if they have the faulty battery pack by going to www.hp.com/support/batteryreplacement.

New Intel Technology Could Shorten PC Boot Up Time

With Robson, a PC pulls data and applications off an add-in flash memory card and Intel software, rather than the PC's hard drive. Potentially, notebook users could experience a longer battery life because the hard drive wouldn't have to work as hard. Intel did not provide exact boot-up time comparisons, but a representative said Robson will cut the amount of time it takes from when you hit the "on" button to when the PC can operate, the time it takes to go from a

sleep state to an active state, and the time it takes to launch an application.

Some Camera Models Have Defective Sensors

Several major camera makers have announced plans to replace faulty CCD sensors in digital cameras and camcorders. CCD sensors capture images. As a result of the defect, images are distorted or non-existent. The CCDs were manufactured between October 2002 and March 2004. Konica Minolta, Canon, Fujifilm and Nikon have sold models that are affected by the problem. More information can be found on their respective sites:

Chip-enabled Soccer Ball

Engineers working on a chip-enabled soccer ball are optimistic about the technology being used at the FIFA (Federation Internationale de Football Association) World Cup soccer tournament in Germany next year. FIFA has shown interest in the technology--largely to help referees make crucial goal-line calls--but has yet to make a final decision. The radio-based tracking system could also be used to determine whether a ball has gone out of bounds, to compile statistics about individual players, and more.


