Speech recognition software has improved considerably over the years and Vicki Wassenhove came before our club to share with us the good merits of the Vista version. The sci-fi images of people issuing commands to computers has been the stuff of legend. Now this concept is gaining critical mass. Vicki observed that many commentators believe that that talking to computers will become the norm in the not to distant future.

The speech recognition software today has improved in three ways. It is 3 times faster than typing. It offers hands free control of your computer. No spelling mistakes will end up in your final work.

This type of computer function requires a fast CPU processor to work, but if you have a newer computer speech recognition will keep up with normal voice cadence. Early versions of this software required you to speak slowly in order to get accurate translations of your spoken word to text. Windows Vista Speech Recognition accuracy improves as you use it. It learns to adapt to your voice.

An enjoyable experience with this software needs a good quality microphone. Also it is essential to follow the tutorial the Windows Vista provides so the Speech Recognition software can learn your voice. Eliminate your

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background noise when using it. Vicki's dog will often bark in the background and the software responds: "I don't understand that command." The dog lovers in the audience got a chuckle.

Vicki also reminded us that patience in the early stages of using this software is the byword. It will take a period for it to learn your voice and for you to learn the set of voice editing commands.

She turned on the speech recognition software and gave us a demo of it. First she told it to open up Word Pad, which it did. Then she proceeded to read a short paragraph on the screen beside it. She spoke the first sentence and it was typed on the screen in real time and effortlessly. She issued a voice command for the next paragraph and her computer responded by moving to the next line. The computer misinterpreted the word "eliminate" and typed "lemon". Vicki by voice command went to the error and a list of word choices appeared and she was able to select the appropriate one from the numbered list.

### Numbered Navigation

Vicki commanded the computer to open up Internet Explorer. She told it to use numbered navigation. On the screen various tab fields and options were numbered. Calling out the associated number to the visual reference point Vicki was able to go to a URL or move about the Internet page.

### Mouse Grid Navigation

Another handy voice command tool is Mouse Grid Navigation. The screen is broken up into a grid of nine numbered squares. She picked out area numbered 7. The computer then replaces grid 7 with a new grid set of 9 numbered squares. Each grid selection reduces the field until the visual square is over the computer option you need.

So if you are curious, perhaps you are disabled, or need your hands free in work while using a

computer, Vista Speech Recognition is worth try. It is seamless, intuitive and could make your computer life easier and more productive.

### Skype.com ( VOIP ) Telephony

Skype was developed in 2002 by the authors who created the Kazaa file sharing software. It has slowly grown to be a popular way to communicate on the Internet. In 2005 it was purchased by eBay. Skype allows you to make computer to computer calls for free, and computer to landline calls for a fee.

Judi was drawn to this software after using several other Instant messaging programs as communication tools. Skype offers features that these other programs do not: conferencing with many people by voice, the ability to send large files over the net, communicating with another via video call, and the option of using SkypeCast to conduct a meeting over the Internet with up to 100 people. Additionally Judi is impressed with the voice quality of this program. One of the drawbacks is that it does not have 911 functions. You must use another telephone access point for emergency calls. The many other features make it worthwhile to examine.

Recently the QCS has been testing and promoting remote computing and has used the Skype program for the audio portion of these broadcasts. If you are interested in participating in these future club events it would be a good idea to install Skype and add the QCS contact to your list.

The software installation is easy, you need headset and a microphone. Many varieties are available: usb connection, sound card

hookup, or bluetooth. If you intend to call landline phones you purchase credit to make those calls. Judi observed that you can purchase credit in \$10 increments which last for 180 days with no contract. Phone calls to the United States and Canada are 2 cents per minute and an international mobile call costs 5.8 cents per minute.

Judi demonstrated a computer to computer call with Jerry Heimberger who was in another part of the building. Skype rang the connection as if it were a phone. They each invoked the video chat which worked well. Judi was using a new beta version of Skype which allows one to share a picture of your desktop with another user while you are online. The image quality of this transmission could be improved. The text was difficult to read. But the beta concept looks promising.

And finally an audience member had a friend in Malaysia who offered to demonstrate the international calling. Judi made this call, and the connection was easy to make and understand.

Skype can be fun. In the next few days Judi will be setting up Skype to auto-answer in the video chat mode so that she can use it as a dog nanny camera for her pet.

So if you are looking for ways to maximize your communications dollar, Skype maybe worth the download, it is free and easy to use.

The QCS would like to thank Vicki and Judi for their fine presentations of these emerging technologies. The future of computing looks fascinating, no doubt about it!

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## **Skype as a "Nanny Cam"**

On the same day as my Skype presentation, I stumbled on the possibility of using Skype as a "Nanny

Cam". I don't have small children, but still the concept interested me. I did not have time to try it out before my presentation, but the next day I did. Since I have dogs, we will call it a "Dog Cam". Here are my results.

I set up a new Skype account just for my dog, whose name is Max. I was able to use the same email address I use for my own account. I set the options to only allow calls from people on his contact list and chose start up with Windows. I set up one contact in his list (myself). I then set up my laptop with the built in webcam in my living room facing the couch where I assumed he would be lounging around during the day. (He is allowed on the furniture). I then went to work a few miles away. I tried to call Max from my office Skype account, but of course he did not answer. I am researching the possibility of automatic answer in Skype. I thought I would have to go back and locate the article detailing this set up because I did not know how they got the Nanny Cam to answer unless the Nanny was obliging. Then I realized I had some other software that we had learned about at the QCS several months prior—remote log in software called Log Me In. I already had that installed on several computers, my laptop at home and 2 computers at work. I used Log Me In to access the laptop at home and remotely made a video call from Skype to myself at my office. I logged off of Log Me In on one computer at work and answered the call on the other. I was now able to view my Living Room, but Max was not lying on the couch as suspected. He was no where in the visual field. So I decided to call his name to see if the audio was working through the PC speakers. After a few seconds, he entered the room to see if I was there. He walked over to the laptop and tried to figure out where my voice was coming from; he could not figure it out and again left the visual field.

I know this may seem like a silly experiment to some, but I had fun trying it and using software products that we have demonstrated at the QCS. I hope others will find practical uses for products we demonstrate or like me just try something for fun. I found the auto-answer feature in Skype under Advanced Options for Calling.

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## **Twitter - What You Are Doing Right Now**

Several of the readers of this column asked me, "What is Twitter?" following the media reports that senators and congress people were "Twittering" during recent presidential speeches. Twitter (the internet service and the person who does the posting) and Twittering or Tweeting (the posting of personal activities on Twitter) has become one of the most popular ways of communicating one's activities so that others can follow what is going on in the life of a Twitter. The service is self-described as, "Twitter is a service for friends, family, and co-workers to communicate and stay connected through the exchange of quick, frequent answers to one simple question: What are you doing?" According to some of the national media quoted by Twitter.com, "The New York Times calls Twitter "one of the fastest-growing phenomena on the Internet." TIME Magazine says,

"Twitter is on its way to becoming the next killer app," and Newsweek noted that "Suddenly, it seems as though all the world's a-twitter." One may wonder why a Twitter user would post his daily activities as they occur; Twitter explains it this way, "Why? Because even basic updates are meaningful to family members, friends, or colleagues-especially when they're timely."

Just to experience the life of a Twitter, I went to [www.twitter.com](http://www.twitter.com) and signed up for a free account. The signup process was very fast and easy, only asking for me to create my user name, create a secure password, and entering my email address. After creating my account, I was given the opportunity to upload a photo of myself for display to anyone that views my Twitter page, and allow me to customize my page to control the way others view it. I entered my first short message that I was using Twitter, and it appeared on my now personalized webpage. Since messages and other postings are intended to appear as text messages on cell phones as well as on a webpage, individual postings are limited to 140 characters, the maximum length of a text message (SMS) allowed on most cell phone systems. As I was typing this column, I posted a Twitter (message) that I was typing this column; if anyone is following my activities at this instant, he would receive this news as a text message on his cell phone, as an RSS feed on his computer, and email, or by simply viewing my Twitter webpage. On my view of my webpage is a text box where I can type my current activity, as long as I keep it under 140 characters, as shown by the counter adjacent to the text box. Postings can be made or received by computer, cell phone text message, Blackberry, or other communications device. Postings can also be received on any newsreader that uses the RSS format news feed.

Twitter makes it very easy to find

friends who also Twitter. By clicking on the "Find People" icon, a window is opened that says "Find people". Follow them". To locate friends on Twitter, I chose to allow Twitter to access my email address book to determine if any of my current correspondents are on Twitter. Twitter can access (but only with your express permission) address books on Yahoo, Gmail, AOL, Hotmail, and MSN. It will quickly scan the online address book, and match any email addresses in the address book against the millions already in the Twitter database. Twitter states that it does not save the email addresses and passwords, and does not send out emails to those located without express permission to do so. I also used the "Find on Twitter" feature to enter my last name to see if any of my relatives are on Twitter, and add them to my friends list. Just as a lark, I entered the names of some of our elected officials, and found that several of them do have Twitter accounts. If I want to invite friends by personal email, I can enter their email addresses in the "Invite by Email" box, and Twitter will send them an invitation.

If I want to add celebrities to my friend's list, I can click on "Suggested Uses", and a list of celebrities who Twitter will be displayed. By checking the box adjacent to their names, we can exchange Twitter posts and monitor each others' activities. Some of the more interesting celebrities and online services that can be added to anyone's Twitter friends list are the Jodrell Bank observatory, the Dell Outlet Store, JetBlue Airways Customer Service (monitors Twitter 24/7), the New York Times, 10 Downing Street (the official residence of the British Prime Minister), rapper M. C. Hammer, CNN Breaking News, Al Gore, John McCain, Whole Foods Market (Fresh organic tweets from Whole Foods Market HQ in Austin), Lance Armstrong, Britney Spears (Yes! This is the real Britney Spears!), George

Stephanopoulos (ABC News Chief Washington Correspondent and Host of "This Week"), Women's Wear Daily, the Nightline TV news show, Martha Stewart, comedian and magician Penn Jillette, rapper 50 cent, and many more. The business and news outlets listed post breaking news or special deals to their Twitter friends. One that I added, being the nascent bargain shopper, is Woot.com, which posts one deeply discounted bargain each day in each of its merchandise categories.

Twitter, the company, is headquartered in San Francisco, and was founded in 2006. It is a small company, with only a few dozen employees, but has millions of members. It has a marketing model to generate revenue, but the revenue model has not yet been implemented, leaving all of the posts and web pages currently free of advertising.

I am not sure how much I will be using Twitter on a regular basis by posting my personal activities and short commentaries, but I will check my page occasionally just to see who is following my activities. The main purpose of Twitter is to answer the question, "What are you doing?" For those who want others to be able to know the answer in real time, they can do so with Twitter.

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## ***How to Control the Display of Your Laptop***

You can control the way Windows looks as well as how your laptop's monitor is configured. To do this, you need to visit the Personalization icon in the Windows Vista Control Panel or the Display icon in the Windows XP Control Panel. Oddly enough, the same icon (shown below) is used in both ver-

sions of Windows.

Display Settings is where you go to set up the laptop for giving a presentation. As shown in the figure, it's where you configure the projector, which is treated like a second monitor.

\* The quickest and handiest way to get to the Personalization or Display Properties dialog box is to right-click a blank part of the desktop and choose Properties from the pop-up menu.

\* Your laptop's display has certain modes and resolutions that work best - for example, 800 x 600 or 1024 x 768. These and other resolutions are known as the native settings for the monitor. Although other resolutions might be possible, the results don't look good and can wreak havoc on the display.

\* You might consider setting a lower resolution and number of colors for your monitor. The higher resolution and color settings require more video memory, which means more work for the computer, more power, and less battery life.

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## Monitor Calibration

For several years, ever since purchasing an Epson Stylus Photo 2200 printer, I have never been sure that what is printed will appear the same as what I see on my computer monitor. This is not really a complaint about the printer; I have printed many stunning images using it. Yet I have also had to reprint images several times to get the proper degree of lightness and, more rarely, the correct color cast.

The most persistent problem has been that the printed images appear a good bit darker than what I see on my monitor from Photoshop. My solution to this has been to simply make the image about +25 brighter in Photoshop when I want to print it. Additionally, a small reduction of the saturation for red is often needed if I want the printed result to be the same as seen on the monitor.

Now, you might ask: How do you know that what you see on the monitor is correct? Good question, and that is where a monitor calibrator comes in. There are several such devices on the market. The one I chose is the one I was shown at North Tampa Photography, the huey by Pantone. It is a small USB device about 4 inches long and a little over one half-inch wide and about one-half inch thick. The cropped photo, Image A below, shows it dangling from the top of my monitor over the blue color portion of Image A during a calibration, with its progress display and cancel button to the left.

It is quite simple to use. First, you install the software from a CD. (By the way, the huey pro is the same hardware item--it just has more advanced software.) Next, you run that software, where the first screen tells you to click the start button. After that you see the second screen, shown at the bottom left of this page, Image B, which tells you to attach the sensor, which has suc-

tion cups, to your monitor. Then you simply follow the on-screen instructions. A number of different colors will appear on screen under the device, as photographed above with a blue light on the screen.

When the calibration is finished, you will be able to see the results of before and after and will also be given the opportunity to place the device in a cradle on your computer desk next to the monitor so that it can re-calibrate your monitor periodically as the room lighting changes.

So, how has this helped my photo-printing problem since I have done nothing to calibrate my printer?

The answer is that, in using a calibrated monitor, you know that what you saw yesterday and see today and will see tomorrow and also see under different room lighting conditions will be the same. That gives you a base from which to make further adjustments. Those adjustments and settings will be made in Photoshop and in the printer dialog settings when you actually print from Photoshop.

All modern photo printers should have an ICC profile for each paper. For example my Epson 2200 printer has a profile named SP2200 Premium Glossy\_PK to use when printing using the Epson glossy paper, and it has similar profiles for each of the other papers. So, when printing my image from Photoshop, I select this profile in the print dialog, along with other settings, which I will omit here but which you can read about in the Matching Prints to Screen link and the huey & huey Pro User Guide link below.

This is supposed to give me a printed result that matches what I see on the monitor. But not quite. It seems that for many photos, I need to increase the brightness in Photoshop to get a printed result matching the monitor.

I purchased my huey locally at North Tampa Photography for \$77. I have seen it on the web anywhere from \$65 to \$90. The huey pro costs around \$30 or \$40 more, and

there is also an upgrade from Pantone from the huey to the huey pro. The Pantone site is [www.pantone.com](http://www.pantone.com).

Color is a much more complicated subject than you might think. Just do a Google search for things like "monitor calibration" or "printer calibration".

The first three links below are articles by a professional photographer named Keith Cooper, whose knowledge about color far exceeds anything I could write. So, if you are interested in better printed photos, read his three articles.

If you are interested in purchasing a Pantone huey color meter, then read the pdf user guide at the link below. This document also has good information on printing from Photoshop, in its last section titled "Printing after the monitor is calibrated."

## **The Healthcare System**

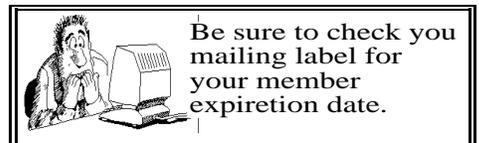

Even without listening I do know that the Obama administration plans to use information technology to bring needed savings. This means that providers will be installing electronic patient records systems. Would you be interested in learning about such systems? I don't mean the big systems used at hospitals like what Ed Heare presented a couple years ago, but rather the systems used by your personal physician and similar providers to store your test results and medical history. ## **Are you Confickered?**

The Conficker worm may be the most successful malware released to date, or the biggest failure. So far it's hard to tell as the April 1 doomsday has come and gone seemingly without consequence. Of course, that does not mean that it's all over. The worm still infects millions of computers. Is your machine among them? The simplest test I have found is an "eye chart" [tinyurl.com/c6yya3](http://tinyurl.com/c6yya3) prepared by a clever programmer ([joestewart.org](http://joestewart.org)). Take a look. If you don't see what you are supposed to see, then check this *eWeek* [tinyurl.com/d4usxe](http://tinyurl.com/d4usxe) article for some free tools to remove the worm.

## **Ultimate Zero-Day Attack**

In an attack that will be hard to top for a long time to come, some almost too clever attackers pirated



and infected a copy of Windows 7 release candidate with malware and started to build a botnet based on the installs. This may be the first case of infecting a version of Windows before it is released, in effect creating their own set of built-in vulnerabilities. Presumably, the carrot was that the pirates had removed the expiration date from the release candidate, or at least claimed they had and then seeded the RC on BitTorrent sites. Researchers at Damballa, an enterprise security firm that specializes in protection from botnets, were able to shut-down the command center. Damballa [damballa.com/](http://damballa.com/) estimated that 27,000 copies were installed in just a couple of weeks. Beyond the piracy angle, this incident points out the dangers in testing prerelease versions of operating systems. To date there are no third-party antivirus or malware detectors that support Windows 7, plus the infection was made even more difficult by the fact that the trojan was “pre-installed.”

### The theme is DMCA

Does the Digital Millennium Copyright Act affect you in your daily life? Not at all? Well, hold on there, keyboard breath! Maybe you should reconsider that position. Ever want to copy a movie DVD to your hard drive so you can watch in on your iPhone or other device? Is the DVD you bought yours or not? Read this PC World [tinyurl.com/q3ro5j](http://tinyurl.com/q3ro5j) article about why you should care about the DVD copying case now in Federal district court. The legal concept of Fair Use, part of copyright law from the very beginning, has been effectively eliminated for any electronic media or device by the DMCA.

Copyright law has become so lopsided that even free speech is affected. Google, owner of YouTube, has filed [tinyurl.com/dx8u3k](http://tinyurl.com/dx8u3k) a detailed submission about how many takedown notices are bogus. The filing

is in New Zealand where a draconian version of the DMCA is under consideration but the statistics are the point.

“In its submission, Google notes that more than half [57%] of the takedown notices it has received under the US Digital Millennium Copyright Act 1998, were sent by business targeting competitors and over one-third [37%] of notices were not valid copyright claims.”

A copyright holder can stifle speech on a website merely by making an accusation of infringement. This example of unintended consequences is not what Congress had in mind. Take another example of wiki operator, Sam Odio [blu-wiki.com/go/Sam\\_Odio](http://blu-wiki.com/go/Sam_Odio), who runs the site [BluWiki.com](http://BluWiki.com) as a hobby from his company OdioWorks. When some BluWiki users started a discussion about interfacing iPods and iPhones to software other than that available from Apple’s iTunes, Apple threatened legal action under the DMCA. OdioWorks took down the discussions but now, with support from the Electronic Frontier Foundation ([eff.org](http://eff.org)), has filed suit against Apple to regain free speech. Read about this on the EFF website [tinyurl.com/ddj39e](http://tinyurl.com/ddj39e).

And finally, lest you think this only affects liberals, consider that the McCain presidential campaign complained to YouTube last October just before the election when the video site took down McCain campaign ads as a result of DMCA complaints from various news organizations. From the [tinyurl.com/nhog66](http://tinyurl.com/nhog66) on the New York Times website:

“The commercials incorporated snippets of television news broadcasts. Using provisions of the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, the news organizations demanded that the commercials be removed from YouTube because they violated the organizations’ copyrights.”

Senator McCain voted for the DMCA, and opposes legislation to enforce network neutrality. The irony of it all! Oh, the irony!
